All Around Us



The basic message of Jesus was: "The kingdom of God is here—and I am it!" But to us things look exactly like they always used to look. So we wonder: Where actually is this kingdom?

Of course, the kingdom is a metaphor, not a definition. It is not a fact, but an event; it is all around us, all the time, just waiting to be entered. So, it is all right that our sense of the kingdom is a little vague. In fact, that just gives it more scope. But what is not all right is the way Christianity has moved the kingdom from earth to heaven, from now to the end of the world.

It was an understandable option. When Jesus did not return immediately, as they expected, to set the world straight, the church settled down for the long haul. And when history did not bring the kingdom any closer, the easy solution was to put it off and up out of sight and out of mind. Precisely the opposite of what Jesus intended.

Jesus proclaimed that the kingdom of God, the governance of God, is here and now. It is not our place to put it off. It is our task to find it, to encourage it and to implement it. Everywhere.

Even among impoverished people? Yes. The kingdom is wherever God's will is done on earth as it is in heaven. Every place on earth is equidistant from God. So we must be able to find the kingdom in dirt roads, cardboard shacks, garbage heaps and filth-filled ditches. The kingdom is found where people share the road, walk the talk, find joy in sorrow and hope in despair.

In our own rich nation there are evils enough for us to doubt the presence of God's kingdom. Yet, every person is dear to God. So it must be possible to do God's will as a homeless person, as a prostitute, as a gang member, as an addict. That seems to be the kind of people Jesus talked with about the kingdom. He even said they would enter the kingdom before virtuous people.

If this offends our sense of propriety, of justice, then we mistake our idea of God's kingdom for God's idea of the kingdom. If God wanted perfection he would have made people differently. If God wanted justice, we would all be damned. If we depended on our own goodness, we would all be lost. No, what God wants, according to the prophet, is for us to love kindly and walk humbly with our God.

The difference the kingdom might make is more obvious in areas of poverty, disease and crime. It is harder to see among middle and upper classes. After all, when you have enough to eat, somewhere to sleep, good clothes to wear and a pension in the future, what more could God offer?

But looks are deceiving. All this security makes us less dependent on God but somehow more anxious. Surveys have found that after a certain level of lifestyle, the degree of people's happiness is in inverse proportion to their wealth. By the time we finally get that heliport on the roof and a cell phone implanted in the brain, we should be totally miserable. And farther from the kingdom.

The kingdom is here and now. But it will get even better. Someday, when we humans have done all the best and worst things possible to do, Jesus will present himself to humankind in his glorious splendor. And we will be so enamored, so smitten that we will do whatever he wants. We will be attracted like iron filings to a magnet, spun around in our tracks, lured into the kingdom.
